

Mr. Carl Smith, DCD Executive Director, also gave an opening speech to welcome the participants. CHID, CPMD, ASC, Rural Addressing, and DCD IT gave presentations in their respective sections.

numbers. The opening sessions became overcrowded and people were standing at the entrances or hung out in the hallways straining to hear the speeches.

CDBG Program Completes Powerline Project



The CDBG Wide Ruins Powerline Project was completed on January 2016 to assist 14 families. The funding for this project came from the FY-2010 ICDBG

(Indian Community Development Block Grant Program under the federal Department of Housing and Urban Development) awards. The amount of the award was \$628,490.

The Navajo Nation CDBG Program, under the Community Housing and Infrastructure Department, works on multiple projects from multiple funding years at the same time. Some of these projects take a long time to complete due to the lengthy processing of documents to comply with the numerous federal and Navajo Nation laws, regulations, and policies.

According to CDBG Programs & Project Specialist, James Adakai, this project was

especially challenging since the project posed some unique challenges making it very different from other powerline projects CDBG has engaged in. They were able to meet the challenges and are very proud to have completed the project as funded.

The Navajo Nation is the only tribe that applies for utility lines through the ICDBG funding program. Other tribes mostly apply for housing rehabilitation.

DCD Helps Deliver Firewood to Elderly Clients



On Friday, January 27, 2017, a team from DCD led by Mr. Carl Smith, Executive Director; Donna Whitehair, CSC from St. Michaels Chapter; and Michele Crank from the President's Office, spent the day delivering firewood to elderly people in remote areas of the chapter. The team had three 4x4 vehicles to navigate the snow-packed roads leading to the houses.

The elderly clients were very grateful for the firewood since the snowpack in most of the areas off the highway made it difficult to get in and out. Many of





the clients also did not have a way to get additional firewood. The winter weather had made the dirt roads a muddy and snowy mess and very difficult, if not impossible, for most vehicles to maneuver.





The team delivered firewood to about 6-7 elderly clients before the day was done. The team will be ready to deliver more firewood as needed when additional firewood is donated and ready for delivery to more clients.



This is from a recent report from the Census Bureau that illustrates expenditures in various industries. The following chart is the amount of spending that was conducted across the United States for the mining industries. The chart shows that from 2014 to 2015, the mining industries decreased their expenditures on structures and equipment. This trend may be important for the Navajo Nation to consider as the global community continues to invest in more sustainable and renewable energy.

Although this self driving car has chrome wheels, it's not the Chrome- Google generally promotes. However, Chrome is a fast, simple, and secure web browser, built for the modern web. Next question - what is a browser? A browser is a program with a graphical user interface for displaying HTML files, used to navigate the World Wide Web. More commonly known as the program to view the web.


• "As of February 2017, StatCounter estimates that Google Chrome has a 62%

- It works seamlessly with your google email and all G suite apps that most android phones now use.
- It's fast and generally will update itself in the background without prompting and it has built- in malware and phishing protections.
- It has a simple clean interface and one omni box to search without toolbars and extensions to "bug" you.



- It also can help keep online private information safe in the user's control.
- Chrome allows the user to sign in to the browser to keep bookmarks, history and any settings they have on another device to the session they are logging into.
- It allows you to customize your experience and keep your apps, extensions and themes for a personalized experience.



Other great features include :

- Drag tabs and re-integrate them into different configurations for better viewing.
- If you have mistakenly closed a tab all you have to do is press Control-Shift-T to reopen recently closed tabs.
- You can set up a separate profile for kids that you monitor and control.



- •Add events in Google Calendar through omnibox.
- •You can zoom in or out on a page by pressing Control while rolling your scroll wheel up or down (or by pressing Control-Plus or Control-Minus), PC users. On a Mac, you can zoom in and out by pressing Command-plus or Command-minus.
- Drag links directly to your desktop.
- You can translate almost any page it's already built in.
- You can cast your screen to any chromecast device or built in google cast enable TV. That means from your phone, laptop or desktop to your TV through your network.
- Chrome works nicely with Google Cloud Printing. Cloud printing allows users to print to any connected printer from anywhere. It's easy to set up any "Cloud Ready" printer, just follow your manufacturer's provided instructions.
